#### Introduction

Kuvempu University is a State University established in 1987 by an Act of the Legislature of the Government of Karnataka. The University is located in a pollutionfree beautiful environment at Shankaraghatta, 28 kilometers from the town of Shivamogga. The territorial jurisdiction of the University is spread over the districts of Shivamogga, and Chikkamagalur with a Post-Graduate centre each at Kadur and Chickkamagaluru.

The University has 39 Post-Graduate departments of studies in the faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce, and Education offering Post graduate programme through semester under CBCS. There are 89 affiliated colleges, four constituent colleges (out of these one is under direct administration). The university is offering programmes through distance education since 2002-03. The University was accredited with three stars by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in the first cycle during 2002 followed by a 'B' grade with the CGPA of 2.89, in the second cycle of accreditation during 2012, and 'A' grade with CGPA of 3.05, in the third cycle of accreditation during 2018. The University is preparing to go through its 4<sup>th</sup> cycle of accreditation during 2024.

# Overall observations, commendations and recommendations

# COMMENDATIONS

- 1) Innovative practices adopted by the examination section in the process of conducting, evaluating, announcement of results and security features incorporated in the marks cards and degree certificates deserve appreciation.
- 2) The faculty members are active in research and have published papers in journals with high impact factor which has helped the university to gain high h-index of 47.
- 3) In addition to scholarships from Government, UGC and other agencies, the additional University scheme of providing research fellowships to the SC/ST, OBC and General category students in each department for promoting research is appreciable.
- 4) Two Patents awarded during the assessment period is an indicative of quality research being carried on by University in nascent areas.
- 5) Involvement of faculty members in placing the alumni in prestigious institutions/ industries deserves appreciation.
- 6) The **"Yoga for Health"** facilitating Yoga practice every day among students, faculty members, residents on the campus and the general public on specific occasions, and regular programs on Art of Living are great initiatives by the University to sow the seeds of moral and ethical values among the youth which is vanishing during recent past.
- 7) The contributions of the NSS have placed the name of the University among the top Universities by bagging the awards such as Best University, Best NSS Coordinator, Best NSS Unit, Best Program Officer and Best Volunteer. It speaks volumes of work done by the NSS unit of the University.
- 8) The University has established a Women's Resource Centre and currently planning to start women studies programme.
- 9) A plethora of prizes won by the sports teams and the cultural teams in interuniversity, national and international sports and cultural competitions proves the outcome of the scholarships instituted by the University.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Need to create ramps to make buildings to be differently abled students friendly.
- 2. There is a need to see that the pattern of presentations to be made by each department is uniform before the ensuing visit of the NAAC peer team.
- 3. Faculty members are to be motivated to submit research projects individually and jointly to funding agencies.
- 4. Thrust Areas of the department and best practices should be focused properly, may be two or three covering all the specializations of the departments.

- 5. Research credentials shall be highlighted in terms of not only number of publications but also should include citations and H: index uniformly.
- 6. Necessary steps have to be taken on priority to fill up the vacant faculty positions to meet the norms of the UGC.
- 7. There is a need to provide additional physical infrastructure facilities to certain departments, wherever there is a paucity of infrastructure on priority.
- 8. Collaborative research programs be encouraged.
- 9. A central instrumentation center to house major equipment may be created to facilitate quality research and also to optimize the usage of equipments.
- 10. Additional sports grounds to meet the requirements of growing number of sports persons to be provided.
- 11. Orient faculty members and students to work towards outcome based education.
- 12. Institute awards for recognizing the good work of teaching and non-teaching faculty members thereby motivating them to perform better.
- 13. Appoint a permanent qualified medical practitioner for the university health center.
- 14. There is a need to establish patent facilitation cell
- 15. Central Animal House facility needs to be created for the university.
