## **General Objectives of the Course:**

- ❖ The course often begins by defining history and its scope, emphasizing its interdisciplinary nature and relationship with other fields like archaeology. Students learn about the different methods used by historians and archaeologists to study the past, including source analysis, interpretation and causation. The course aims to develop critical thinking skills, including the ability to evaluate historical narratives and understand different perspectives.
- ❖ Students learn about the scientific methods used in archaeological research, including excavation, analysis and interpretation of artifacts. The syllabus often focuses on specific archaeological sites and artifacts, helping students understand the material culture of past societies.
- ❖ Students learn to critically analyze primary and secondary historical sources, identifying biases and evaluating their reliability. The syllabus may include assignments that encourage students to conduct independent research, using library resources and other sources. The course may explore different interpretations of historical events and debates among historians and archaeologists.
- ❖ Students learn about the importance of preserving cultural heritage, including historical sites, artifacts and traditions. The course may explore the role of museums and archives in preserving and exhibiting cultural heritage. Students may learn about the role of tourism in promoting and managing cultural heritage sites.
